
Hello!

Eden Gate 2020—New Project Update

Eden Gate plan to launch a new “Assertive Outreach” project that we’re aiming to pilot from Saturday 14th November 2020. We have been in discussions with Supporting People (NCC), The Wallich and Helen Jones who are all supportive of this new project and we’ll continue to work closely with them throughout.

Eden Gate’s Assertive Outreach project seeks to meet those sleeping rough in Newport at their sleeping place on a Saturday and Sunday morning to provide them with a welfare check, breakfast, and the opportunity to access housing related support with our staff. The assertive outreach project will be followed by a drop-in service at our premises on Hill Street for those with support needs. This project aims to replicate the highly successful “Breakfast run” model that is provided on weekday mornings by the Wallich. Eden Gate’s assertive outreach project will form a continuation of this project, therefore bridging the weekend gap. If you know of anyone interested in volunteering please pass contact Katie Graham.

This means that Eden Gate will now be providing a total of 5 drop-in services each week:

Tuesdays 10am – 1pm

Wednesday 10am – 1pm

Thursday 10am – 1pm,

Saturday 10am – 1pm (Rough sleepers only)

Sunday 10am – 1pm (Rough sleepers only)

It has shown us the need for prayer



Growing up in Ukraine, I had very different Christmases to the ones I have experienced in the UK. On Christmas Eve we would walk to church in the freezing cold, we would sing carols at our friends' house, then home for dinner and to open presents under the tree.

I am sure that the majority of the other families that got one were much worse off than we were, so to this day I think I didn't really deserve that shoebox. The rules must have been less strict back then because, amongst other things, it contained rich tea biscuits and a jar of strawberry jam.

My absolute favourite item, however, was a photo of three smiling children with beautiful red hair in front of a lovely, large brick house. I only remember one name from the message written on the back of the photo, Angus.




We're told to "only go out for essentials"

Welcome to Beechwood WI



We were established in January 2015, and currently have around 40 members. We have a vibrant programme of monthly meetings, which in the past has included Taiko drumming, salsa dancing and sword fighting!

There's always time for a cuppa and a chat at each meeting, and we regularly keep in touch via email and our Facebook page. Between meetings and before Covid 19, we often go to see shows at The Dolman Theatre as optional extra trips. We also encourage our members to contribute their ideas for meetings and activities through our suggestion box which is available at every meeting.

We are delighted to now be meeting on the first Monday of the month (this may change due to bank holidays) at the new **Jubilee Hall, St Julian's Baptist Church, 33 Beaufort Road**. Doors open at 7pm with the meeting starting at 7.15 and running until around 9pm. Each meeting has a themed activity, though due to Covid 19, we may have to have speakers via, or hold meetings through, Zoom.

You are welcome to attend a meeting as a visitor (a maximum of three visits is permitted). Each visit is £4 plus an optional £1 for refreshments (if available, in line with COVID restrictions) with which you will receive a raffle ticket for our raffle that takes place at the end of the evening. However, you can currently try us out until April 2021 for only £10.75. If you would like to join as a member the national subscription rate is currently £44 per year, paid in April and reduced quarterly for new members starting later in the year. For this you will receive many benefits: at least 11 monthly meetings, eight copies of WI Life (the WI membership magazine), a monthly federation newsletter and various discounts for shops, restaurants etc.

Although we have not been able to have a formal opening for the building due to the ongoing restrictions on sizes of gatherings, we have already started using it both for our own activities and for several community services and hirings. Please do get in touch with us if you are interested in using any of our church spaces.

Obviously a massive thanks goes to Ed and his team of builders and contractors, to Mark Tutton as the architect, and to all in the church who helped in various ways with planning, fundraising and administration. We were able to make a small presentation to Ed and



to Mark in a recent service to say thank you. Most of all our thanks to God for giving us the vision in the first place, the determination to keep going, and for always providing for our needs, just as he promises to. May this hall be for His glory and for the blessing of everyone in our community of St. Julians throughout the coming years.



Gifts with a special touch!

Many think that we started giving gifts at Christmas following the example of the wise men who brought gifts to Jesus. But we don't tend to give strange gifts like **gold, frankincense and myrrh!**

These gifts were not chosen to be practical or even fun, instead they were symbolic of who this baby Jesus really was and what he would do on earth.

Gold was a gift always presented to a king for a state visit, and Jesus was the promised King of all Kings.

Frankincense was used by the priests to offer at the temple altar. It represents God's presence. This gift was a way of declaring that Jesus was God in human form. Jesus would also be our heavenly priest, opening the way for us to come into God's presence.

Myrrh was a spice used for burial of the dead, so this gift was predicting that Jesus would die as a sacrifice for our sins, and be buried in a tomb. Some of the women followers of Jesus took myrrh and other spices to anoint his body after he died on the cross. Instead they discovered the empty tomb and saw that Jesus had risen from the dead.

The wise men understood these things and brought expensive gifts. But the other Christmas visitors were poor shepherds, and we are not told that they brought any gifts at all. Instead, they simply came themselves to worship Jesus and be the first to share the good news that he had been born. This Christmas, why not do the same as the shepherds did, and come simply to worship Jesus as King, and God, and sacrifice?



Attending Our Christmas Services 2020

As always we invite you to join us for our Christmas services and warm welcome awaits you.

To keep you safe we have put into place some measures, we are asking the following:-

Masks must be worn inside the Church at all times, unless you have a medical condition which prevents you from doing so.

Mini Mincemeat Muffins

*These heavenly cupcakes are a real festive treat.
Topped with a creamy cheese and cinnamon topping.*



Serves: 12 people

Ingredients:

200g Self raising flour
100g Caster sugar
100ml Sunflower oil
100ml Milk
1 Large Egg
200g Sweet mincemeat

Frosting:

140g Butter, softened
280g icing sugar
1/2 tsp Ground cinnamon
A little milk
12x Glace cherries

Method

Pre-heat the oven to 180°C/305°F/Gas mark 4.
Mix the flour and sugar together, then make a well in the centre. Mix the oil, milk and egg together, then pour into the well of the flour mixture and beat well. Then mix in the mincemeat. Divide the mixture between 12 muffin/cupcake cases. Bake for 20 minutes.
Meanwhile make the frosting: Cream the butter with the icing sugar and mix in the cinnamon and a little milk to make it more manageable. When muffins are cooked, let them cool before covering them with the frosting. Top each muffin with a cherry and serve.

There was a man called Isaiah who lived in Israel about 700 BC. He was a "Prophet of God" which is a way of saying that God used Isaiah as a spokesperson to give messages to certain people at certain times. Sometimes these messages were pretty hard hitting and challenged people to the core. That's why prophets tended to have a hard time of it - people often didn't like or appreciate what a Prophet of God had to say.

But it wasn't always a message of doom and gloom. In Isaiah's writings he speaks of a time when the world will be crying out for a saviour - a "man with a plan" - a Messiah to rescue the nations from the nightmarish scenarios plaguing the world (not unlike our world right now) This is how he pictures it in Isaiah chapter 9 in the Old Testament of the Bible:

'The people who walk in darkness shall see a great Light - a Light that will shine on all those who live in the land of the shadow of death. For unto us a child is born; unto us a son is given; and the government shall be upon his shoulders. These will be his royal titles: "Wonderful," "Counsellor," "The Mighty God," "The Everlasting Father," "The Prince of Peace." His ever-expanding, peaceful government will never end. He will rule with perfect fairness and justice from the throne of his father David. He will bring true justice and peace to all the nations of the world. This is going to happen because the Lord of heaven's armies (God) has dedicated himself to do it!' (Isaiah 9:2,6-7 in 'The Living Bible')

The world is often a dark place and has a lot for us to deal with - much more than we are humanly able to bear or endure (if we're honest) which is why, just as in Isaiah's day we too need a rescuer. We desperately need to be saved and unfortunately, superheroes are only the stuff of Hollywood and comics.


